In the days to come I wish you every success in preparing the young in your care to the very best of your ability. The young of today are the Church of tomorrow. They deserve the best kind of commitment that we can give them. They are our investment for the future.

Finally, I wish every blessing on every family of St Clare's community. May your patroness of Assisi be ever your help in the days to come.

A Homily for the Jubilee Mass

Ezekiel 34: 11-12, 15-17, Phillipians 4: 4-9, Matthew 18: 1-5,10

Looking back on 50 years, two words come to mind - CHANGE and THANKSGIVING. With lots of changes in fifty years, we've learned to cope, but perhaps replacing the word **Change** with the word **Transformation** might help us better see the hand of God at work - the God who is making all things new (Rev 21:5). The beautiful Phoenix sculpture on the road to the station is a symbol of the new that's rising from the ashes of the old Easterhouse.



Our Golden Jubilee celebration should be an act of thanksgiving to God for all He has done. Rightly the prophet Ezekiel calls God a true shepherd, forever watching over us. Today we thank God for all who have shared in his plans for this parish - for our celebration is not about buildings, it's about people. We thank God for the 3 bishops, 23 priests, 10 sisters, but above all for the thousands of parishioners who've been the living stones over 50 years.


Today is also a day to thank God for the inspirational lives of three great saints. Firstly Saint Clare, with a spirituality born of a love of simplicity, poverty and complete trust in God. Secondly, Saint Vincent de Paul: Gerry McCann can tell you about the Conference set up in the parish to give practical help to the poor of the area. An even greater legacy of Vincent has been the 18 years of ministry by the Daughters of Charity – listening, supporting, and encouraging. They showed us how to care for each other. Thirdly, Saint John Bosco, founder of the Salesians, whose feast is celebrated today. The Salesians continue his work and promote a Salesian spirituality that values gentleness and kindness, and is born of a love for young people and a concern for their happiness. Don Bosco's genius was to show us how holiness and happiness go hand in hand. Like Saint Paul, Don Bosco wished that everyone should know the happiness of living a good Christian life. Young people are special – as Jesus reminds us in today's Gospel reading – they challenge us to leave behind old certainties and closed attitudes and be open to the demands of the present moment. If we rise to that challenge, we will find ourselves being transformed.

We've a lot to be happy about. St Clare's Parish should look back on 50 years with pride, and see the riches with which we have been blessed. We pray for those Priests and Parishioners who have gone to their reward, and thank God that the parish is still here, proclaiming the Gospel and trying to live it. Now we must look forward and be open to the promptings of the Spirit and to whatever transformation and re-creation God has planned for us. Our journey of faith continues.

The beginning.....

The Foundation of the Parish on 18 Dec 1959. A small beginning, perhaps just a letter from Bishop Scanlan to Fr Edward Doherty, parish priest of Carluke, asking him to found a new parish. A small beginning: no church, no chapel house: Fr Doherty, like everyone else, lived up a close at No 45 Lochend Road. For the next 6 years this would be an Oratory and home for the priests serving St Clare's.



A small beginning, a priest and his flock, but like the mustard seed – that great sign of the Kingdom – the parish has grown and continues its mission.

As the parish grew it became evident that another priest was needed, and in November 1960 Fr Brian Donnelly was appointed assistant priest.

Masses and other services were held in St Clare's School, St Bridget's Church Baillieston, the Oratory at Lochend Road, the Convent of Mercy

Baillieston, and latterly at St Benedict's Church.

In the early years, men and women of the parish joined separate groups like the Union of Catholic Mothers and the Men's Guild. These groups were active in fundraising, but more importantly they gave parishioners an opportunity to meet up and socialise.

Children encouraged to join the football teams. the Guides. Brownies and the various clubs that had been set up by the parish and which took place St Clare's in School. The football teams were very successful and over the years won many trophies and awards.



The Building of the Church

Fr John Moss replaced Fr Doherty as Parish Priest in 1964. Work started on the building of the new church in





August of that year. The foundations were ready for the walls by the middle of October. Throughout the winter work progressed and at the beginning of May 1965 a start was made on the roof. In June 1966 the church was ready for use.

Prior to the church opening, a Building Fund was started, with collectors going round the homes of parishioners every Friday night. Families also donated money for altar cloths, crucifix, candlesticks, altar bell etc. The statue of St Clare was donated from America.



A six-year dream for thousands of Catholics came true with the opening of the Church. For parishioners it was the end of services in the school hall. A guard of honour from the local Girl Guide troop lined the car park as Bishop Thomson made his way to the Church for the ceremony. Father John Moss told a packed church, "This is a day of joy and I would like to thank everyone who has made it possible".

The church had a seating capacity of 672. Parish population was 5,000

St Vincent De Paul Society

The conference in St Clare's was recognised as a



member of the International Society in 1971. John Sheridan was the President, and led the society to do great works of charity for many years. In 1978 there was a massive change when, to meet the needs of the area at that time, a Furniture Project was setup. Indeed this was the first full-time project in the country, and over the years was replicated by many parishes and other organisations. The society was affectionately known by locals as "The Vinny". This project continued for 30 years.

Father Thomas Colm Morris parish priest of St Clare's (1972 – 1976) created the side chapel outside of the sacristy; this was used for daily Mass with the intention that it would be warmer than the main church, especially in winter.

Fr Richard J Rodgers was responsible for setting up the parish choir. An accomplished organist, he encouraged young and old to become involved in the music liturgy. As a Master of Ceremonies for Bishop Thomson he also trained the Altar Servers to a very high standard. Bishop Thomson often commented that they were the best in the Diocese.

School Chaplain

The parish had a full-time school chaplain, Fr Brian Donnelly, who worked in St Leonard's Secondary School. Fr Donnelly was also involved in the setting up of many youth clubs within the parish.

The Parish Tea Room

The first tables used were made from old breadboards which had folding legs attached to them. Later we moved upmarket when the BBC donated second-hand table and chairs from their canteen.

The Salesians arrive in St Clare's Beginning of the Joint Pastoral Project

The Salesians came to St Benedict's at the invitation of Bishop Devine in 1987. Later in 1996, Bishop Devine asked the Salesians to widen their work. agreed to the setting up of a team to include Salesians, Salesian Sisters and the of Daughters Charity, a team which would be entrusted with

the care of two parishes: St Benedict's and St Clare's.

In this way the Joint Pastoral Project was born, and over the years a Team of priests and sisters worked with the people of both parishes to build up the parish communities, and help parishioners take a more active part in the leadership and life of each parish. The parishes work together as much as possible, sharing resources and materials and planning events together. Each parish has an active Parish Pastoral Team, a Pastoral Plan and many parish groups and organisations.

1990's The Boxing Day Storm 1998

After the great celebration of Christmas, parishioners were shocked and very upset when they came up for Sunday Mass to discover the church had been seriously damaged by the storm. Pieces of the roof were scattered all over Drumlanrig Avenue with a section



protruding from the roof of one of the newly built houses across the road. Thankfully no one was hurt (this may not have been the case as Fr Jim, Fr Kieran and Gerry & Jo McCann had gone into the church during the storm to move the Blessed Sacrament and other items to a place of safety)

Parish Memories ~ Quotes

In 1960, when I moved here to Easterhouse at the age of 9, there was no church. We had to use the school assembly hall which was very different from the beautiful church I was married in. That was 1971 and I still love coming on a Sunday morning to see the same old faces, and I hope to renew my wedding vows in 2011 which will be my, sorry, *our* 40th Anniversary.

Growing up in the parish, I remember when the passkeepers had to squeeze as many people as possible into the pews. It was so busy people would sometimes faint with the heat. In those days there were 4 priests and, when it was time to go to confession, parishioners would wait outside the confessional of the priest who would be most lenient in giving a penance. This usually worked out ok, but often the priests everyone was trying to avoid would come out and tell people to sit outside their confessional!

Easterhouse, and especially St Clare's, will always have a special place in my heart. There is warmth in the parish that you won't find anywhere else.

After the death of my parents, I sat about the house with nothing much to do. I was encouraged to become involved in parish work. It was the best thing I ever did, and I have loved every minute of it.

I look forward to catching up with everyone on a Sunday. I can find out the "Local News" about what is happening in the area.

The thing I like best about the parish is the fact that, even though I hadn't been to Mass for a long time, I was welcomed back as if I hadn't been away. That was important to me.

I remember being brought over to Mass with my school class every First Friday of the month and on Holydays of Obligation. Although my parents didn't attend regularly, when they saw me making an effort to go on a Sunday by myself they started going too. I was delighted!


